Welcome to our Outcome Report for 2023.

It has been another good (and very busy) year for MVA.

Grateful thanks for ongoing support from our funders and many partners (their logos are shown on this slide).

It remains a privilege to work alongside the ever-growing and thriving VCSEF (Voluntary, Community, Social Enterprise and Faith) sector in Medway and beyond. We have continued to provide relevant and useful information to over 1000 charities in Medway alone.

In 2023 MVA's support to the VCSEF resulted in £928,891 being allocated to VCSEF organisations through successful funding applications. Since 2019 we have supported the sector to raise £6.5m – a return on investment for Medway Council of £13 for every £1 provided via the MVA funding support mechanism of the Infrastructure contract.

The local VCSEF continues to face many challenges; the continued Cost of Living Crisis, difficulties in recruiting new volunteers and ongoing issues in securing longer term funding. We can weather this storm together and are with them every step of the way.

As you would expect from an organisation committed to continuous learning and development, we have also started to share our best practice and tools with VCSEF organisations across the county. We look forward to continued development of our services in 2024 to support and capacity build within the VCSEF in both Medway and Kent.

Supporting Medway Voluntary, Community, Social Enterprise & Faith (VCSEF) Sectors

67 attended the Funding & Governance club representing 31 members from 28 different organisations

VCS Transformation Academy

In 2023, the Transformation Academy concluded its first year and began its second year.

Academy members have now decided their second year objective:

Increasing the sector's capacity, ability and skills to demonstrate and communicate the impact of their work in order to improve their credibility and sustainability and improve local lives.

In 2023, Transformation Academy members started the process to sign up for coaching their peers in the VCSEF Sector; and they offered free sector wide training based around storytelling.



Transformation Academy members have received £3,300 in Task and Finish payments to date.

Over 30 VCSEF organisations have been members of the Academy since inception.

Over 700+ organisations from the wider VCS given access to TA Resources

Over **750** hours of 'Generous Leadership' given to Transformation Academy to date

Befriending Together

This year MVA has been working in partnership with Carers First, wHoo Cares and Swale CVS to deliver the programme in Medway and Swale.

Now established as an innovative way of connecting people who have become isolated and lonely, the programme offers bi-weekly group meetings in a various of locations for Medway residents as well as regular groups and activities for those living in Swale.

During the year our Bingo sessions, have been very popular and Seated Exercise has supported people to enjoy gentle exercise sessions to music. In addition we have introduced Horticultural Therapy activites which have been delivered by one of our volunteers.



354 people have been referred to the service this year

55% of people referred were isolated and **38%** were lonely.

64 group meetings delivered with **273** attendances

59% increased their mental wellbeing

60% improved their social connections

Befriending Together Projects

Couch 2 Community

These sessions continued during 2023 and the funding from KCF provided a range of activities. Members of the Befriending Programme were able to attend seated dance sessions, improving their physical health and a 'Cream Tea' afternoon and trip to Herne Bay enabled people to socialise with thereby improving their mental well being.

Test Bed Fund

Grants were offered to organisations to deliver activities which strengthened community cohesion through befriending services. 30 groups applied and 13 were successful in securing funding. The activities offered ranged from music sessions to fitness and cookery. 1213 people were estimated to have participated in activities, and in total 1845 people actually benefitted across all the activities.



181 people sessions and gained new skills, increased confidence and feel safer and connected

3 new volunteers were recruited

18 activities delivered including seated exercise, craft and cookery sessions and Bingo.

13 VCS groups received a total of £65,000 to deliver projects to reduce isolation and loneliness

Woodwork and craft sessions enabled participants who may be widowed, retired, isolated and lonely to talk and bond whilst engaged in activities this led to participants socialising outside of the session, increasing their own social network and mental wellbeing

35% more people than predicted attended the 464 sessions

Project Joy!


Joy Marketplace is a directory of services for Medway and Swale's community groups. We started September 1st laying the foundation blocks and establishing a directory that allows social prescribers to refer their clients to activities provided by the Voluntary Community Social Enterprise and Faith sectors (VCSEF). Funding is attached with payments made per referral accepted.

We began by introducing social prescribers to the Joy system, setting accounts and training.

We have engaged the VCSEF organisations through email campaigns, delivered a webinar, printed leaflets, and had face to face meetings. The more that join the greater the impact.

Medway Volunteer Network

During 2023, Medway Volunteer Network continued to promote volunteering across Medway online, through regular MVN Bulletins and at a range of events and activities.

During June's National Volunteers Week, MVA'a singing volunteer bears Vic and Viv travelled far and wide to to say a huge 'thank you' to Medway's amazing volunteers. Medway's volunteers were also celebrated through the Barry Clout Awards. The quality of nominations highlighted the extraordinary contributions of individual volunteers and volunteer teams. Certificates were awarded to the winner of each category by The Mayor of Medway, Cllr Nina Gurung at MVA's AGM in November 2023.

From December 2023, attention turned to future development of MVN. A new **Volunteering and Community Development** Officer was recruited and in post. Planning started for even more opportunities and support for both Medway residents and VCSEF organisations to launch early 2024. This involved 808 support activities for existing organisations and 153 activities supporting new start ups

Macmillan 'Year of Listening' Medway & Swale

"We will reflect and represent the communities we serve in everything we do to support everyone living with cancer"

(Macmillan's 5 aims in the plan for 2023 – Objective 6)

Medway and Swale areas underperform in many cancer system indicators and there are diverse inequalities in engagement with cancer services in these areas.

The aim of the programme has been to work in partnership with local Voluntary and Community organisations as well as delivering events across Medway and Swale to understand the barriers and challenges people are experiencing in accessing local cancer treatment and support services.

Engagement activities focused on people from one of five community characteristics which included people aged over 60, people living with a disability/limited daily activities, people of the Global Majority (formerly BAME), people from LGBTQIA+ communities and those from coastal towns and/or geographic areas experiencing high deprivation.

Cancer survival rates in Medway and Swale have been among the lowest in the country for some time.

We engaged with **903** respondents - at events, focus groups, surveys, via What App sessions and using ICL model

Community Health Catalyst Programme

Funding for the Community Health Catalyst Programme has been extended until 31st August 2024 and entered its second year of delivery during 2023.

Working with the local VCSEF sector, we have engaged with communities from the NHS Core 20 PLUS 5 health inclusion groups across Medway and Swale.

Since the project began, we have engaged with 1133 people across Medway and Swale and held listening groups and individual interviews with 246 people from 10 health inclusion groups, to understand the personal impact of health inequalities on their wellbeing and what they feel is needed to overcome these issues.

We have signposted 133 individuals and delivered 18 Local Asset and Signposting Plans to VCSEF groups and their service users, supporting communities to engage with the plan and access local support including NHS screening services, housing advice, food banks, energy saving advice, suicide prevention and support, befriending services and local activities This programme is funded by the Medway and Swale Health and Care Partnership







In 2023 we engaged with 922 people from 11 CORE 20 PLUS 5 communities across Medway & Swale through partnership working with the VCSEF

The Community Health Catalyst
Programme in Medway & Swale has involved
more than 100 VCSEF Organisations

We have signposted 133 individuals to local support services across Medway & Swale

78% of people across Medway & Swale that were engaged with feel they know more about the Health & Care Partnership

Involving Medway & Swale


A partnership between community organisations and Medway & Swale Health and Care Partnership aimed at building healthier communities.

In 2023 the Involving Medway & Swale programme engaged with residents on the topic of COPD

The concept of IMS is to provide VCS groups and organisations opportunities to access community grant funding to co - develop 'quick win' initiatives with their service users in response to the issues they identify during the Focus Group activities - supporting a goal of 'meaningful engagement and lasting change'.









194 participants across 9 organisations running 15 focus groups. With 50% of participants from people of a global majority.

We supported our active focus group organisations generate £3,360 extra income.

Engaged with **70** VCS organisations to help facilitate focus group ups with their service users.

92% of participants felt the activity made them feel more supported and listened to about issues impacting their health of 77% felt there was a significant increase.

Looking Ahead to 2024...

- → The growth and development of both our Transformation Academy and Alliance
- → Celebrating our 35th year
