ABOUT THIS DUET

The Katie Lee Biegel Rosé takes its cues from traditional French ones—light, crisp, and fresh. Star sommelier André Mack of Maison Noir takes a different approach with his wine: Always one to buck the trends, his Rosé is richer in body, with vibrant notes of strawberries, watermelon, and kiwi.

ABOUT THIS DUET

Isola del Mare blends the best of Tuscany and Sicily into a rich Italian red, a strong contrast with Cottanera's Diciassettesalme, a single-varietal Nerello Mascalese from a small plot high on the slopes of Mount Etna. Elegant, with notes of ripe strawberries and dried herbs, Diciassettesalme expresses finesse while Isola del Mare favors power and lushness.

ABOUT THIS DUET

Our Gold Rush red blend is inspired by Italian immigrants seeking their fortunes in California's Sierra Foothills. Their winemaking knowledge laid the groundwork for the California wine industry. At the same time, Englishman Samuel Smith made a small fortune in the Australian gold rush and founded Yalumba, Australia's oldest family-owned winery.
