CRITICAL LANGUAGE **SCHOLARSHIP**







The Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) Program is an immersive summer opportunity for American college and university students to learn languages essential to America's engagement with the world.

A program of the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, the CLS Program is part of a U.S. government effort to increase the number of Americans studying and mastering critical foreign languages and applying those skills in their professional careers.

Students spend eight to ten weeks over the summer studying one of thirteen critical languages (see right) in classes facilitated by native speakers at a host institution abroad.


STUDY ABROAD, OR STUDY WITH SPARK!

Each summer, the CLS Program administers intensive study abroad institutes in thirteen critical languages around the world. The CLS Program, through its CLS Spark initiative, provides beginner-level virtual instruction for Arabic, Chinese, and Russian for competitively selected U.S. undergraduate students whose home campuses do not offer these languages.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE

CLS Program institutes cover approximately one academic year of university-level language coursework during an eight- to tenweek program and meet the needs of students from a variety of language levels and backgrounds.

In addition to formal classroom instruction, there are oneon-one meetings with native speaker language partners for conversational practice, as well as cultural activities and excursions to expand students' understanding of the history, politics, culture and daily life of their host country.

ELIGIBILITY

Applicants must be U.S. citizens or nationals in a U.S. degreegranting program at the undergraduate or graduate level at the time of their application. We encourage students pursuing professional or associates degrees and those attending community colleges and technical schools to apply. Only undergraduate students are eligible to apply to CLS Spark.

Students in all disciplines, including business, engineering, the arts and humanities, and the sciences are encouraged to apply. All applicants should have a plan to continue studying the language and explain how they will use the language in their future careers.

The CLS Program welcomes all eligible applications and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, religion, geographic location, socio-economic status, disability, sexual orientation or gender identity.

CLS SPARK

CLS Spark is a virtual initiative of the CLS Program which provides instruction in Arabic, Chinese and Russian at the beginning level. CLS Spark leverages best practices in online language learning, helping American undergraduates study critical languages virtually when they may not have access on their campuses or the ability to study abroad. CLS Spark alumni receive automatic consideration as semifinalists for the subsequent summer CLS Program to continue study of the same language if they submit an application and meet eligibility requirements.

Applications are due in November each year.



WHAT IS A CRITICAL LANGUAGE?

Critical languages are languages that are essential to the United States' national security, economic prosperity, and engagement with the world, and that tend to be less commonly taught in the United States or have relatively few proficient speakers.

The CLS Program plays an important role in preparing American students for the 21st century's globalized workforce, increasing American competitiveness, and contributing to national security. CLS scholars build mutual understanding with the people of their host countries and represent the diversity of the United States.

LANGUAGES AND LEVELS

Applicants may select one of the following language programs:
