

Year 10: Year 10 looked at describing characters from the perspective of various pieces of art and later explored punctuation with a piece about penguins and alpacapillars!


Year 11: Year 11 continued with their revision on different questions from the Literature paper based on their study of "The Crucible"

Maths News

Year 7 students learnt how to identify the term-to-term rule of a sequence and refined their overall knowledge of sequences through team work and a game show.




Year 8 students compared their results of an experiment involving a 20-sided die with theoretical probability. They saw that with lots and lots of new trials, the experimental probability is getting closer to the theoretical value.

Year 10 students extended their knowledge of converting metric units by researching the largest and smallest units of length in space, as well as connecting the origins of the metric system with the French revolution idea.

Year 11 students recalled all transformations and learnt about negative enlargement and conditional probability. In preparations for their mocks, the students collected all their knowledge in a chapter summary document.

Negative enlargement

With negative enlargement each point and its image are on opposite sides of the centre of enlargement. The scale factor of enlargement is calculated in the same way, remembering, however, to write a '-' before the number



Year 12 students connected the idea of definite integration with calculating the area bounded by a curve and x-axis and demonstrated solid integration skills.

PE News:

During PE lessons this week, students continued working on their new practical sporting units, developing the fundamental skills required when playing striking and fielding games. Years 7 & 8 continued on their kickball unit, focusing on the key components of kicking the ball into space and running efficiently around the bases. Year 9 began their Danish longball unit, looking at the techniques involved when batting and fielding, whilst Year 10 developed their rounders skills, focusing on finding space when batting, whilst Year 11 were also introduced to Danish Longball.

Science News:

Y7 students used a microscope to carry out their practical lesson. They investigated their own cheek cells. They took a sample of their cells, stained them with methylene blue and viewed them under a microscope. They clearly saw the cell membrane, cytoplasm, and nuclei.




Y8 students started to learn about electromagnets this week, so they decided to make one themselves. They took a copper wire which they then wrapped around an iron nail. They turned the electromagnet on by connecting it to the power supply. With the help of induced magnetic field, they were able to pick up some paper clips.



Year 10 Biology students were learning about structures in the skin that are involved with the process of homeostasis. They could spot some cool patterns through the microscopes. Do you think you would be able to name the components seen in the picture below?





This week's practical work began with year 12's practicing the practical paper once again to prepare for the practical in the summer. They investigated rates of reaction for the reaction between sodium thiosulphate and hydrochloric acid and investigated unknown cations and anions in a compound.
