BRITISH STANDARDS OF CONTRACT FURNITURE

The following list details some of the more prevalent British standards which apply to the supply of non-domestic (or contract) furniture. This list is not exhaustive, and excludes those standards which apply to flammability, fire testing and so on, which are covered in a separate info pack.

In general the standards can be divided into the following broad categories:

- Flame retardancy and smoke emission standards.
- Colour fastness.
- Rub fastness resistance to colour transfer onto other textiles.
- Light fastness ability of a textile to retain its colour under the influence of light.
- Abrasion resistance quoted as a measure of Martindale Cycles, the item is rubbed against a standard woollen fabric while a given weight-load is applied, estimates the durability.
- Piling like the abrasion test with no weight applied.
- Weathering fastness indicates the degree to which a given textile fades when exposed to outdoor weather conditions.

BS EN1335-1

Office furniture - Office work chair - Part 1: Dimensions (Specifies heights, widths, depths etc for three types of chair; Type A is fully ergonomic; Type B is a standard chair; Type C is the so called "Management Chair" with thicker upholstery).

BS EN1335-2

Office furniture - Office work chair - Part 2: Safety Requirements (Part 3: Test Methods is scoped for persons weighing 110kg and 8 hours use per day).

BS EN13761

Office furniture - Visitor's chairs (Safety requirements for all types of visitor's chairs i.e.: chairs other than work chairs).

BS EN15373

Furniture - Strength, durability and safety - Requirements for non-domestic seating.

BS2543

Upholstery fabrics for end use applications. Classification (Specifies test levels for seam slippage, abrasion resistance, pile loss, and colour fastness to water).

BS4723

Stretch covers for upholstered furniture. Specification.

BS5459-2

Specification for performance requirements and tests for office furniture: Part 2. Office Seating. (Scoped for persons weighing up to 150kg, or for 24 hour use).

BS5790 - ISO 7617-2

Coated fabrics for upholstery. Specification for PVC coated woven fabrics.

BS7176

Specification for resistance to ignition of upholstered furniture for non-domestic seating by testing composites (Specifies test levels according to the class of nondomestic premises, most non-domestic premises are Medium Hazard; but Offices and Schools can be Low Hazard).

BS 7176

2007 - Specification for resistance to ignition of upholstered furniture for nondomestic seating by testing composites - medium hazard.

BS 2543

2004 - Upholstery fabrics for end use applications. Classification - GC (general contract use).
