**COMPLAINT FOR WRONGFUL DEATH**

Plaintiff, Richelle Brown, as Personal Representative of the Estate of Mary Billman,  
by and through undersigned counsel, sues Defendant, Big Olaf Creamery, a Florida limited  
liability company, for her Complaint alleges as follows:

**GENERAL ALLEGATIONS**

1. Plaintiff, Richelle Brown, is the duly appointed Personal Representative of the  
Estate of Mary Billman and resides in the State of California.

2. This action is brought on behalf of the Decedent’s survivors and Estate. The  
survivor is identified as the husband of Mary Billman:

a) Richard Billman, is the husband of the Decedent, Mary Billman.  
Richard Billman seeks to recover the value of lost support and services from the date of

1 Decedent's injury to her death, with interest, and future loss of support and services from the  
2 date of death and reduced to present value. Richard Billman also seeks to recover the loss of  
3 Decedent's companionship and protection and for mental pain and suffering from the date of  
4 injury.

5 3. Defendant, Big Olaf Creamery, LLC, was at all times relevant a limited  
6 liability company organized under the laws of the State of Florida, with its principal office  
7 and business location at 2001 Cattlemen Road, Sarasota, Florida 34232. The Defendant was  
8 therefore, at all times relevant, a citizen of the State of Florida.

9 4. Defendant is a creamery that manufactures, distributes, and sells ice cream  
10 products. On information and belief, the Defendant prepares and sells its products for service  
11 and sale at retail ice cream parlors, including ice cream parlors owned and operated by the  
12 Defendant under the name "Big Olaf's Creamery." Big Olaf's website states as follows:

13 Our primary focus is to serve ice cream parlors with a full range of premium  
14 frozen products. The ice cream is made at a small creamery in Sarasota's  
15 Amish village of Pinecraft. Every tub of Big Olaf Ice Cream is hand mixed  
with the finest ingredients and is then churned in batch freezers by local  
Amish Craftsmen.

16 The smooth, creamery consistency comes from two sources: attention to  
17 detail, and fresh, high butter fat (14%) milk.

### 18 **JURISDICTION**

19 5. This Court has jurisdiction over the subject matter of this action pursuant to  
20 28 U.S.C. section 1332(a) because the matter in controversy exceeds \$75,000.00 exclusive of  
21 costs and it is between citizens of different states.



1           10. Listeriosis is a serious infection caused by the bacteria *Listeria*  
 2 *monocytogenes*. People usually become ill with listeriosis after eating contaminated  
 3 food. The disease primarily affects pregnant women, newborns, older adults, and people with  
 4 weakened immune systems. It's rare for people in other groups to get sick with *Listeria*  
 5 *monocytogenes* infection.

6           11. Listeriosis is usually a mild illness for pregnant women, but it causes severe  
 7 disease in the fetus or newborn baby. Some people with *Listeria monocytogenes* infections,  
 8 most commonly adults 65 years and older and people with weakened immune systems,  
 9 develop severe infections of the bloodstream (causing sepsis) or brain (causing meningitis or  
 10 encephalitis). *Listeria monocytogenes* infections can sometimes affect other parts of the  
 11 body, including bones, joints, and sites in the chest and abdomen.

#### 12 **Historical outbreaks linked to ice cream products**

13           12. Outbreaks of foodborne disease linked to contaminated ice cream products are  
 14 by no means a new phenomenon. The following chart provides representative examples:

**The *Listeria monocytogenes* illness and death of Mary Katherine Billman**

13. On January 18, 2022, Mrs. Billman was in the State of Florida, visiting her daughter who lives in Hollywood, Florida. On this date, at the Big Olaf's Creamery ice

1 cream parlor located at 3350 Bahia Vista in Sarasota, Florida, Mrs. Billman consumed ice  
2 cream that had been manufactured, distributed, and sold by the Defendant Big Olaf. The ice  
3 cream that Mrs. Billman consumed on this date was contaminated by *Listeria*  
4 *monocytogenes*.

5 14. On or about January 25, 2022, Mrs. Billman began to suffer from  
6 gastrointestinal symptoms and a low-grade fever. She was scheduled to travel to California  
7 that day with her daughter, but on the advice of a physician at a local walk-in clinic, she did  
8 not make the trip. Urinalysis done on a specimen given on this date showed that Mrs.  
9 Billman was suffering from a urinary tract infection.

10 15. Mrs. Billman's symptoms persisted, and on January 27, 2022, she woke up  
11 with a fever over 103 degrees. Her daughter called and ambulance and Mrs. Billman was  
12 rushed to the emergency department at Memorial Regional Hospital in Hollywood, Florida,  
13 where she soon began treatment for a septic illness.

14 16. Over the course of the next two days, Mrs. Billman's organs began to shut  
15 down due to her septic illness. By the time her family was able to see her again, she was  
16 unconscious. She would never regain consciousness, and died on January 29, 2022, leaving  
17 behind her husband, the Plaintiff; three daughters named Kelli Mitsdarfer, Kara Gray, and  
18 Richelle Brown; eight grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

**COUNT I**  
**Strict Liability**

1  
2  
3 17. Plaintiff readopts and incorporates by reference the allegations contained in  
4 paragraphs 1 through 16 as though fully set forth herein.

5 18. The adulterated ice cream products that Big Olaf manufactured and sold to the  
6 decedent were, at the time the food products left the control of Big Olaf, defective and  
7 unreasonably dangerous because the ice cream products were contaminated by *Listeria*  
8 *monocytogenes*, a dangerous foodborne pathogen.

9 19. The ice cream products reached the decedent without any change in their  
10 defective condition, and the decedent used the food products for their intended use by  
11 consuming them. That the ice cream products were contaminated by *Listeria*  
12 *monocytogenes*, a dangerous foodborne pathogen, rendered them defective in that the risks  
13 associated with consuming the ice cream products exceeded a reasonable buyer's  
14 expectations.

15 20. Big Olaf owed the decedent a duty to design, manufacture, and sell food that  
16 was not adulterated, that was fit for human consumption, that was reasonably safe in  
17 construction, and that was free of pathogenic bacteria or other substances injurious to human  
18 health. Big Olaf breached this duty.

19 21. As a direct and proximate result of the defective and unreasonably dangerous  
20 condition of the adulterated ice cream products that Big Olaf manufactured and sold, Mary  
21

1 Billman was injured and died and the Personal Representative is entitled to recover all  
2 damages specified in Florida Wrongful Death Act on behalf of the Estate and survivors.

3 **COUNT II**  
4 **Breach of Warranty**

5 22. Plaintiff readopts and incorporates by reference the allegations contained in  
6 paragraphs 1 through 16 as though fully set forth herein.

7 23. Big Olaf is liable to the Plaintiff for breach of express and implied warranties  
8 that it made regarding the ice cream products sold to decedent. These express and implied  
9 warranties included the implied warranties of merchantability and fitness for a particular use.

10 24. Specifically, Big Olaf expressly warranted, through its sale of food to the  
11 public and by the statements and conduct of its employees and agents, that the food that Big  
12 Olaf prepared and sold was fit for human consumption and was not otherwise adulterated or  
13 injurious to health.

14 25. Plaintiff alleges that the adulterated ice cream products that Big Olaf sold to  
15 the decedent would not pass without exception in the trade and were therefore in breach of  
16 the implied warranty of merchantability.

17 26. Plaintiff alleges that the adulterated ice cream products that Big Olaf sold to  
18 the decedent was not fit for the uses and purposes intended, *i.e.*, human consumption, and  
19 that these ice cream products were therefore in breach of the implied warranty of fitness for  
20 their intended use.

1 defects, and that otherwise complied with applicable statutes, laws, regulations, or safety  
2 codes. Big Olaf breached this duty and was therefore negligent.

3 33. As a direct and proximate result of the aforementioned acts and omissions of  
4 negligence, the Plaintiff sustained injuries and damages in an amount in excess of the  
5 jurisdictional minimum of this Court.

6 **JURY TRIAL DEMAND**

7 Plaintiff demands trial by jury of all issues so triable on all counts.

8 **PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

9 **WHEREFORE**, Plaintiff prays for judgment against the Defendant as follows:

10 A. Ordering compensation for all general, special, incidental, and consequential  
11 damages suffered by Plaintiff because of Defendant's conduct.

12 B. Awarding Plaintiff costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees to  
13 the fullest extent allowed by law; and

14 C. Granting all such additional and/or further relief as this Court deems just and  
15 equitable.
