Annika Ranin

Bio

Annika Ranin is a BIFA long-listed producer with multifaceted experience in film production, financing, and independent film business. In 2019 Annika founded production company Unmannered Limited, which focuses on film and TV projects with a strong artistic approach and international commercial viability. Her debut feature BOARDERS, directed by Annika together with Sean Fee, about British skateboarding was released in the UK in July 2021 and was longlisted for the BIFA Discovery and Breakthrough Producer Awards. Her second feature MY EVEREST was released theatrically in UK in April 2023. The film premiered at the BFI IMAX to great reviews, including a mention on The Times Critics' 'Best Films of 2023' listing.

Bio

Emma Norton is an emerging documentary Producer with an interest in bringing diverse stories to screen that amplify under–represented voices. They have produced a range of short films, including the 360 VR project "Virtually There", which premiered at the London Film Festival 2021, and the BFI Doc Society funded short "Weathering", which was acquired by Al Jazeera Witness. They are currently producing their first feature, "Look At Me Then Up", in addition to two short film projects due for release in 2024. Alongside their work as a freelance Producer, Emma is also a Production Manager, having supported teams on projects including the BIFA and BAFTA nominated "Rebellion", the BIFA award–winning "Evelyn", the Oscar–nominated "The Edge of Democracy", and the Emmy award–winning "Nightcrawlers".

Look At Me Then Up (working title)

"Look At Me And Then Up", is the debut feature documentary of directors Ira Putilova and Tasya Zaslavskaya. This deeply personal film follows Tasya's life as she is forced to flee Russia due to her family's vocal opposition to the war in Ukraine. With her life uprooted, she finds a lifeline through her Jewish ancestry, which grants her Israeli citizenship. Tasya navigates her journey into adulthood, struggling to fit in and far from home. And when another violent conflict suddenly reaches her doorstep, she is left fearing for her life whilst wrestling with the profound costs of war, her national identity, and a deep uncertainty about what her future holds.
