

Approximate Time: 90 - 120 Minutes

Suggestions for teachers

- 1. The activities take you through a large portion of the Saint Louis Zoo. Make sure your students are familiar with the Zoo layout or have a map.
- 2. Divide your students into groups of five or fewer students with an adult.
- 3. Make sure everyone has comfortable walking shoes, and remind them to dress appropriately for the weather.

Start your scavenger hunt at the Herpetarium Herpetarium




