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

Transportation bills in Congress still cause for concern

The House is in the spotlight on federal transportation funding, following Senate passage of its version of the bill. Last week, the Senate approved a \$109 billion transportation bill. The bipartisan bill passed by a vote of 74-22. After all the rhetoric and amendments and work to support trails in the House and Senate transportation bills, it looks like there will be an extension of the current programs. John Mica (R-FL), Chair of the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, said the House won't address the bill passed by the Senate, but will simply extend the funding authorization, possibly until the November elections. 

Jennifer Rigby, Director of The Acorn Group, tells us how to approach designing exhibits or signs for new trails and visitor centers: "An interpretive master plan challenges you to take stock of your site, tease out the important elements and messages, and determine which communication strategies are best suited for achieving your interpretive goals." More than just words: experience trails through interactive interpretive panels

More than words, interactive signs amplify the experience of trail patrons by engaging the senses. When multiple senses are engaged, awareness is heightened, which means patrons are more likely to internalize the information contained on a single sign. **Interpretive Graphics** explains how this internalization fosters connections, increases the desire for stewardship, and intensifies the desire for more learning, making interactive signage a powerful interpretive tool. *Read more...*

Interpretive signs for Illinois Route 66 National Scenic Byway

Signs and interpretive wayside panels bring Illinois Route 66 Heritage Road to life for visitors from around the world. The first phase of the project produced an interpretive master plan with multiple access points and hundreds of attractions from Chicago to St. Louis. The second phase featured interpretive wayside panels, designed by **iZone**, shaped in a streamlined design, with supports meant to resemble chrome features of 1950s automobiles. *Read more and see photos...*

National Water Trails System to promote healthy, accessible rivers

The Department of the Interior has announced a Secretarial Order that establishes national water trails as a class of national recreational trails. The stated goal is to "help facilitate outdoor recreation on waterways in and around urban areas, and provide national recognition and resources to existing, local water trails." The Chattahoochee River Water Trail in Georgia will be the first river to be included as a National Water Trail under the new system. <u>Read more...</u>

New boardwalk at Washington Wildlife Refuge increases visitation

The Tacoma (WA) News Tribune reports that the Nisqually Estuary Boardwalk Trail has become a big attraction since it opened a year ago: "For the first time at the Nisqually National Wildlife Refuge, visitation topped 200,000 for the year. That count was 33 percent higher than the previous year. The \$2.8 million, mile-long boardwalk was one of the key new elements when the refuge tore down much of the Brown Farm dike and trail as part of the refuge's three-year, \$13 million restoration project." Rail trail across the Mississippi River planned for Memphis

Arkansas and Tennessee Departments of Transportation are looking into a pedestrian walkway and bike path along the Harahan Bridge, as a way of extending the Mississippi River Trail across the river. The project combines longstanding efforts to improve the downtown Memphis mall and to

establish a bicycling and walking route across the Mississippi River on the 1916 Harahan Bridge -- a railroad span that has, on both sides of the tracks, cantilevered structures that once carried motor vehicles. <u>Read more and see photos...</u>

As river health improves, interest in water trails increases

In New Jersey, the South Bergenite reports on increasing recreation opportunities along two local rivers. "Sandwiched between the Passaic River and the Hackensack River, South Bergen residents have access to both rivers and the programming that focuses on them. And local officials in charge of programming along the rivers say as the health of the rivers slowly improves, there's more to see and do each time you make it out onto one of the waterways." *Read more and see photos...*

Frisco Trail repairs of 2011 flood damage expected to begin

The Fayetteville Flyer (AR) reports on the repairs of the severe flood damage from 2011, which are just now getting underway on the Frisco Trail. "Heavy flooding last April caused a large portion of the streamside slope leading up to the trail to be washed away. Part of the expected delay was attributed to the lengthy processes needed just to get the project out for bid. The slope damage was so severe that repairs required a lot more than just pouring some concrete." *Read more and see photos...*

TRACKS works for better trail systems in Arizona

TRACKS is a group of over 350 volunteers who plan, build, and maintain over 200 miles of trails for hikers, mountain bikers, equestrians, and trail runners in the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forests of northeast Arizona. Much of the work involves coordination with the U.S. Forest Service as well as with the Arizona State Committee on Trails. The group has been working to develop the White Mountains Trail System since the early 1990s. <u>Read more and see photos...</u>

Children's Center trail project helps break down barriers

A new "barriers" trail is helping patients at the Children's Center in Bethany, Oklahoma learn to maneuver on and around common barriers in a safe environment. The trail includes surface challenge areas made of materials patients may face in everyday situations. Materials include concrete, rubber, pea gravel, brick with mortar joints, mulch, boardwalk decking, and concrete pavers. The trail was funded by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, OK Department of Transportation, and OK Recreational Trails Program. Read more and see photos...

Best Practices: Principles of Ecologically Sustainable Trails

Trails are our most important tool for linking conservation and recreation. As such, they must be developed and maintained in ways that avoid negative impacts to our ecological resources. These "guiding principles" when developing and maintaining trail systems are from the Massachusetts Dept. of Conservation and Recreation and their *Trails Guidelines and Best Practices Manual*, and adapted from Minnesota DNR's *Trails and Waterways Trail Planning*, *Design*, and *Development Guidelines*. <u>Learn more...</u>
