What is an OHV Ambassador?

• OHV **Ambassadors are** trained volunteers that help conserve **OHV** riding opportunities by working cooperatively with Arizona land managers.



Background

March 2006 most important needs were identified by BLM, State Parks, Forest Service and Arizona Game and Fish Department related to Off Highway Vehicle Needs in Arizona

> Lack of On the ground presence Effective Public Education





OHV Ambassador Program Beginnings

- Multiagency effort determined that a dedicated group of volunteer who were able to do supervised project work and public interaction would be able to help meet priority needs.
- Fall of 2007 first group of 27 volunteers attended training to become OHV Ambassadors facilitated and supported by Arizona State Parks, Bureau of Land Management, Arizona Game and Fish, U. S. Forest Service, and AZOHVC.

Three areas near Metropolitan Phoenix Area selected- Lake Pleasant Area, North Scottsdale Area, and Florence Junction Area.

Purpose of the Ambassador Program



 Provide a cadre of trained volunteers to assist Arizona
Resource Agencies to conserve OHV riding
opportunities



Functions of the Ambassadors





- Maintain motorized areas, roads, trails, and facilities
- Provide a recognizable presence on public and state lands
- Model appropriate riding behavior
- Provide educational and informative materials to the public

Ambassador Activities

- Ride trails to identify and record resource needs.
- Work with Officials to manage for responsible OHV use.
- Provide informational maps and materials to recreationists.
- Participate in special on the ground projects.
- Receive OHV training.
- Participate as BLM, Forest Service, and State volunteers.

Scope of Pilot Program

- 70 Ambassadors trained 2007 and 2008
- Pilot Program sites:
 - Lake Pleasant Area- includes the Bradshaw Foothills Area, Boulders Staging Area, and Table Mesa Road, west of I-17
 - North Scottsdale Area- includes Granite Mountain Multi-Use Area and the Tonto National Forest (Cave Creek Ranger District)
 - Florence Junction Areaincludes Desert Wells Multi-Use Area and the BLM portion of the Middle Gila Canyons area





Training Orientation Components of Ambassador Program

Program Accomplishments to Date:

Ambassador Service:

- BLM: 66 shifts (volunteers), 745 hours of volunteer service
- USFS: 73 shifts, 539 hours
- ASLD: 23 shifts, 163 hours
- Multiagency : 52 shifts, 160 hours

TOTAL:

1607 hours X \$18.55 = \$29,809.85 Total Shifts: 214


