


Trail Facts

- Construction complete by Fall 2017
- Segments of the trail will not open until the trail is fully constructed
- Construction will continue past the designated end point southwest of Ireland Way along the E-470 right of way to the Arapahoe/Douglas County line
- Although this segment will be constructed, there will be no access past Ireland to this section of the trail—future tie-in and connectivity for this area are being explored by local jurisdictions and stakeholders
- Connections and wayfinding signage to regional trails are being considered
- Environmental considerations are being made as the final alignment is designed

Multi-Purpose Bike and Pedestrian Trail Overview

As part of E-470's Road Widening Project, a multi-use bike and pedestrian trail is being constructed on the west side of E-470 from Quincy Avenue to the southwest of Ireland Way. The trail will include the following elements:


- A 10-foot wide concrete path with two (2)-foot shoulders
- An eight (8)-foot screen wall separating the trail from E-470 in some areas
- Various landscaping buffers including trees and shrubs
- Two (2) grade-separated crossings at Arapahoe Road and Piney Creek
- Four (4) at-grade crossings at Quincy Avenue, Smoky Hill Road, S. Gartrell Road and S. Ireland Way

Quincy Avenue to South Ireland Way



E-470 is a 47-mile, 75 mph toll road that runs along the eastern perimeter of the Denver metropolitan area. The road is financed, constructed, operated and governed by the E-470 Public Highway Authority. E-470 is composed of eight local member governments: Adam, Arapahoe and Douglas countries, and the municipalities of Aurora, Brighton, Commerce City, Parker and Thornton.
