# Motivation - Opportunities for exposure to risk are growing

- More multi-use trails built throughout the state
- More people of all ages and abilities using trails
- New Yorkers not accustomed to obey crosswalk laws



## Goal

- Learn more about the status of road and trail intersection design and safety in New York
- Increase awareness of road and trail intersection safety for trail users and motorists
- Suggest ways to further optimize the safety of road and trail intersections



# Methodology

### Review existing studies and design guidelines

### Survey practitioners

- Phase One 1896 individuals
  - Trail managers
  - Local elected officials
  - County planners
  - County highway superintendents
  - Bicycle pedestrian coordinators NYSDOT, MPO
  - NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) and NYS Parks regional personnel
- Phase Two 108 individuals
  - Bicycle pedestrian coordinators NYSDOT, MPO
  - NYSDEC and NYS Parks regional personnel
  - County Traffic Safety Board chairpersons



# Surveys - Information sought

- Type of trail and classification of road crossed
- Road and trail intersection design
- Occurrence and nature of crashes
- Nature and number of safety complaints
- Suggestions for improving road and trail intersection safety

## Who responded

#### **Phase One**

- 9% response rate
  - > 212 surveys
  - > 194 trails, 174 individuals
  - 56 of New York's 62 counties represented
  - > 50% highway superintendents and public works departments (44% local,6% county)

#### **Phase Two**

- 18.5% response rate
  - > 20 surveys



# What we learned - Complaints

## **Previous safety complaints**

- 39 (20%) Phase One survey
- 8 (35%) Phase Two survey
- Speeding vehicles
- Poor sight distance
- 60% Phase One and 65% Phase Two little or no idea of design guidelines used

## What we learned - Crashes

#### Limited information

- > 41 unknown (21%)
- 42 no answer (22%)

## 7 crashes reported

- > 2 bicyclists; 1 pedestrian
- > 3 OHVs (dirt bikes, ATVs, 4-wheelers); 1-snowmobile

#### 3 fatal

- cyclist alignment issues, well signed
- > ATV rider illegal use, no on-road signs
- ATV rider legal use, user error, well signed



# What we learned – Suggestions to improve safety

#### Design

- Signage for road and trails focus on alerting motorist to trail (14)
- Crosswalks (12)



- Maintenance sight distance and crosswalks
- Enforcement speed limits, crosswalk laws
- Education



## Recommendations

- Policy changes
- Design suggestions to supplement current guidelines and standards, keyed to road and trail traffic volume
- Public education



# Suggested Policy changes

- Refine or clarify existing laws to account for trails as a transportation corridor and address the unique needs of road and trail intersections
  - E.g., Are trails equivalent to sidewalks in the definition of an unmarked crosswalk? (V&T 110 (a))
- Crash reporting
  - Add category for road and trail intersection crashes to existing forms to aid information collection and retrieval
- Maintenance
  - > Funding assistance
  - Improve communication among involved parties




# Public Education Campaign Stop, Watch, Walk!

## Initial Focus – Erie Canalway Trail

- Name recognition and visibility
- Large number of users
- Many intersections with striped crosswalks







# Public education – Message Stop, Watch, Walk!

#### Motorists

- Slow down
- Watch for trail users
- Obey existing crosswalk laws yield to pedestrians or dismounted cyclists

#### Trail users

- Stop at road and trail intersections; cyclists dismount
- Watch for cars, be sure drivers see you
- Walk across
- Collisions between trail users and motorists are not accidents. They are <u>crashes</u> that can be prevented

## Public education campaign



#### Stop, Watch, Walk! Be Alert - Use Caution!

New traits are opening all over New York State and they're becoming more and more popular. Persons young and old are increasingly using trails for transportation, recreation, and health.

Many trails, especially multi-use trails, cross roads at some point. These road and trail intersections are potential trouble spots for crashes. Trail users and motorists can work together to prevent crashes.

#### ( Ise caution at road and trail crossings.

By enjoying a trail responsibly, you can make an important contribution to the safety of other trail users. As a motorist, being alert and watching for trail intersections can help save lives in your community.
