



The Grand Trunk Trailblazers:



Fell into dormancy after a few years, no success



- GTTB re energized trail advocates, using success from Corps in partnership with NPS Opacum Land Trust again to promote the trail

- A long-distance mostly off-road trail built on the former Grand Trunk, P&W, and Airline rail beds from Franklin to the Pioneer Valley

Letting It Simmer:

- Advocacy continues today building representation in each town with at least one group locally promoting the trail.
- The details of route planning, partnership building, grants, & construction in various stages now underway in each community.



When Do We Eat!

- 2- 3 years: Completed trail wide organization and planning, partnerships fully identified and working, continuing small grant local funding construction
- 3-5 years: Numerous 10 Mile (+) sections fully constructed and open for use
- 5-10 years: Major funding projects (Bridges) and final route addressed
- 10-15 years: Trail Complete in 25 years

Reviewing the Steps:

- Start building small and local, find your friends!
 Identify the movers and shakers!
- Create/identify a 501 (3) c, Have a vision! THINK BIG
- Identify Partners, How can we help each other contact best!
- Build on small successes, the big ones take time!
 Volunteer days are great, help a partner!
- Celebrate every chance you get! GET THE WORD OUT!
- Key word: Net work, net work, net work!
 Keep developing those partnerships!
- Remember: Rome was not built in one day!
 Building trails takes time AND patience!
