• Primary goals and objectives of the innovation

- Act upon South Sudan's national Food Systems Transformation priorities
- Facilitate state level dialogues involving key food system actors that develops a vision and pathways to building the resilience of local food systems
- Targeted regime / food system level: local food systems at state level
 - Focus on transitioning humanitarian aid architecture towards food systems transformation
 - Take a systems approach to co-create shared understanding of local food systems' behaviour & performance: developing vision and pathways to building FSR
 - Provide and demonstrate scope for HDP-Nexus programming, Localisation Agenda and local food systems governance





Connecting to South Sudan's needs

- What needs in South Sudan's food or aid system does your innovation intend to address?
 - The initiative acts upon South Sudans national FST priorities and put these to practice at state / county / payam level
 - > Develops a vision and pathways based on local context and dynamics
 - Builds resilience of food systems in face of climate shocks; develops food systems for peace; ensures food systems based on proper NRM and producing variety of foods; strengthens resilience of food systems through value chain/agrifood enterprise development
 - Engages with local and central government
 - Invests in developing food sysmtes governance

• Initiative brings the agenda from 'policy' to 'practice' (local/national/regional/global)

- Position the dialogues in the public domain
- Hosted by important actors: GoSS, UNMISS, PfPRR, ARG
- Places 'peace' at the centre of the FST dialogue nexus programming
- Promotes important role for knowledge organisations and different types of knowledge





• Positive Outcomes: What good results or breakthroughs have we seen?

- Buy-in by key stakeholders including government (UNFSS+2)
- Shared vision providing alignment of current projects &longer-term programming framework
- Learning/knowledge agenda provides space for evidence based adaptive programming , and developing 'principled approaches' based on field realities informing national policies and FST approaches

• Challenges: What difficulties or barriers are faced?

- Agencies still operate in 'humanitarian domain': silos competition
- Develop FSR literacy is key importance of the dialogues!
- Donors are yet to develop funding strategies in support of FST

Changing the System: How is it altering the current way of doing things?

- Increased awareness amongst key FS actors for need&opportunity to take food systems lens in FS analysis and programming - GoSS, FAO, WFP
- Development and acting upon longer term pathways to build FSR evidence based adaptive programming
- Informing national/global agenda: FST that builds resilience



• Positive Forces: What existing trends are supported

- Need to operationalise the FST agenda by setting practival examples GNAFC / FS Coordination Hub / Fighting Food Crises along the Nexus Coalition
- Realisation that current 'humanitarian' engagement is not going to end food crises focus on FST agenda: SDGs and beyond (Africa's position on food systems)
- Increased pressure by donors to taking a food systems approach transitioning away from humanitarian assistance
- Strong interest by local government to act upon the needs&ambitions of local pupulations decentralised food systems governance
- Local populations to have 'voice' multiple realities

• Alignment: How to connect with these trends?

- Setting practival examples in the field
- Networking, lobby & advocacy at local and national level
- Engagement at IGAD African food systems agenda ~ food crises
- Engagement global bodies such as the GNAFC need for practical approaches / actionability
