LOOK AT IT / STUDY IT ...

— THE PRINCIPLE OF OWNERSHIP —

Matthew 25:14

¹⁴ Again, it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted his property to them.

• Here at the very beginning, why is it significant that the players in this story are called "servants" rather than "partners" or "co-owners"?

- Even though there is not enough time to name everything, still take the time to give aloud a substantial list of what you have that God owns. And don't give the easy answer "everything."
- Which item(s) on the list are more difficult to relinquish to the principle of ownership? Explain.

1 Timothy 6:7

• Why are some things easier to hand over than others?

— THE PRINCIPLE OF ACTION —

Matthew 25:15-18

¹⁵ To one he gave five talents of money, to another two talents, and to another one talent, each according to his ability. Then he went on his journey. ¹⁶ The man who had received the five talents went at once and put his money to work and gained five more. ¹⁷ So also, the one with the two talents gained two more. ¹⁸ But the man who had received the one talent went off, dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

- What is happening in the minds of the two servants who act "at once" (v. 16)?
- What is ruling in the mind of the servant who does not act at all (v. 18)?

— THE PRINCIPLE OF RESPONSIBILITY —

Matthew 25:19, 24-30

¹⁹ After a long time the master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them ... ²⁴ "Then the man who had received the one talent came. 'Master,' he said, 'I knew that you are a hard man, harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed. ²⁵ So I was afraid and went out and hid your talent in the ground. See, here is what belongs to you.' ²⁶ "His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed? ²⁷ Well then, you should have put my money on deposit with the bankers, so that when I returned I would have received it back with interest. ²⁸ "'Take the talent from him and give it to the one who has the ten talents. ²⁹ For everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him. ³⁰ And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

- What do you think of the Master in the story is he too harsh, not harsh enough or reasonable? Explain your answer.
- How does the one talent man actually blame his Master for his own failure to act (vs. 24-25)?
- What disappoints the Master the most? Why?

— THE PRINCIPLE OF MULTIPLICATION —

Matthew 25:23, 29

²³ His master replied, "Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!" ... ²⁹ For everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him.

- What matters the most to the Master the amount entrusted (5, 2, 1), or the action taken? Explain.
- How did the Master honor the first two servants?
- Why is the third servant's responsibility taken away?
- What is the Master attempting to communicate to him by this action?

— THE PRINCIPLE OF REWARD —

Matthew 25:21-23

²¹ "His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. - How can being given more responsibility (*"many things"* vs. 21, 23) be thought of as a reward?
- What does the Master mean when he invites the faithful servants to "share your Master's happiness" (v. 23)?

USE IT / APPLY IT ...

- In this story, what disappoints God more being fearfully cautious or being fearlessly bold? Explain.
- How do you usually feel when you are given responsibility anxious / proud / overwhelmed / secure? Explain your answer.
- Why did Jesus tell this story (context)?
- What is our version of digging a hole to hide what God has entrusted to us? How do we do it? What does it look like?
- How can we avoid fearful digging as we choose bold action?
- Close by asking God to help us to use what He has entrusted to us.
