ABOUT THE FILMMAKER

Peter Bratt is an award winning screenwriter and independent filmmaker. His first film **FOLLOW ME HOME** (1996) was in competition at 1996 Sundance Film Festival and won the Best Feature Film Audience Award that same year at the San Francisco International Film Festival.

In 2009, Pratt wrote and directed **LA MISSION**, which he also producded with his brother, Benjamin. For his work on La Mission, Peter received the prestigious Norman Lear Writer's award and was one of 10 American independent filmmakers selected by Sundance and the President's Committee on Arts and Humanities to launch Sundance Film Forward. Bratt is also a San Francisco Film Commissioner and a long time consultant for the Friendship House Association of American Indians, a local non-profit serving the Bay Area's Native population.

DOLORES IN CONTEXT


DOLORES (2017), directed by Peter Pratt, is releasing during of time where overshadowed, forgotten, or erased individuals from history are now getting their recognition. **DOLORES** is a documentary about Dolores Huerta, who is a civil rights and women's rights activist. She played a large role in the labor movement and the United Farm Workers of America (UFW).

Huerta was one of the three co-founders of the organization. Some of Huerta's work includes coming up with the slogan "Si se puede", fighting for the inclusion of women and families, and serving as vice president. Not only has she done work for farm workers but has helped fight for women, but that work came later in her life. She has spoken against the sexism in the labor movement and UFW but in later protests the treatment of woman farm workers. She has also used her platform to speak about women's issues.

The erasure of Huerta is something many women, people of color, and people in the LGBT+ community from history face. This problem is slowly being fixed with the use of film, which can be seen with some of the features that have come out in recent years. Great examples are **THE IMITATION GAME** (2014), directed by Motern Tyldum, about mathematician Alan Turning and his help breaking the Nazi Enigma Code and **HIDDEN FIGURES** (2016), directed by Theodore Melfi, about a team of African American women mathematicians who played a vital role in the NASA space program in the early years.

All these films have individuals who have made great impacts but where not included in the history books for being homosexual and women of color. But now through film we are getting to learn their stories. Huerta is now a part of this trend, with her own documentary.
