

Film/Style 3 is an introduction to the aesthetic techniques employed by some of the most influential filmmakers in the medium's history. In this five-week Course, we will explore the complex interplay of narrative, cinematography, and sound that shapes our viewing experience. Students do not need to have attended Film/Style 1 or 2 to enroll in this class.

Beginning with what is considered to be the last film of the daring Czech New Wave movement, Valerie and Her Week of Wonders, we learn how the camera can be used not only to frame a shot, but to blur the boundaries between fantasy and reality. In the second week we tackle how a soundtrack creates mood and atmosphere in a film, focusing on Quincy Jones' dynamic score for In the Heat of the Night. In weeks three and four we focus on narrative structure (or the lack thereof) through two stylistically different though equally complex films: Jacques Demy's Donkey Skin and Lucrecia Martel's La Cienaga. For the last week of class, we discuss how Grey Gardens was a crucial turning point away from the prevailing trends of 1960s and 70s documentary filmmaking.



Deep Dive will distill the five-week Courses experience into one intensive class session. With a particular focus on stylistically innovative work, thematically "difficult" films, or challenging aesthetic concepts, Courses: Deep Dive aims to demystify filmmaking and empower audiences with the confidence to discuss the more technical aspects of storytelling.

Deep Dive's inaugural class will be, "How to Watch Experimental Films." Students will watch works by Germaine Dulac, Maya Deren, Chris Marker, Marie Menken, Trinh T. Minh-Ha, and Stan Brakhage, among others, and practice the tools of film analysis and criticism. The Course consists of an introductory lecture and a guided discussion. Light snacks and refreshments will be provided during class.

The two-screen (206-seat and 96-seat) cinema we opened a decade ago within the Saddle Creek Records complex—located one block west of TD Ameritrade ballpark. Free lot parking is accessible from 14th Street between Cuming and Mike Fahey Streets. Street parking is also available in the vicinity surrounding the cinema (free after 9 pm and all day on Sunday).

DUNDEE THEATER

Omaha's longest-surviving cinema, now with two screens: the historic 300-seat Peggy Payne Theater and the 25-seat Linder Microcinema. Dine-in or carry out from **Kitchen Table Central** and choose from a selection of film books, DVDs, and Blu-rays, in the new "Katie's Video" bookstore. Free parking is available in the lot to the north and east of the theater, and in the NRG Media lot (5011 Capitol Ave) after 5 pm weekdays and all day Sat-Sun.

ACCESSIBILITY

All public areas of the Ruth Sokolof Theater and Dundee Theater are fully accessible. The parking lots adjacent to our cinemas include reserved accessible spots, and seating at both cinemas can be reserved for patrons using wheelchairs and their parties. Assistive devices are available at both venues (Fidelio and CaptiView), and hearing loop technology is now installed at the Dundee Theater for patrons with telecoil-equipped hearing aids.
